

NDS Statement of Institutional Effectiveness

Notre Dame Seminary Graduate School of Theology (NDS) measures its effectiveness through the use of sustainable, institution-wide assessment processes which measure the extent to which each program is achieving its stated outcomes. In accordance with its mission, NDS offers four graduate degree programs: the Master of Divinity; Master of Arts (Theological Studies); Master of Arts (Philosophy for Theological Studies); and the Master of Arts in Pastoral Leadership. In addition to these graduate programs, NDS offers a post-baccalaureate Bachelor of Philosophy (Philosophy for Theological Studies) degree program. NDS is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC), and the Association of Theological Schools (ATS). In addition, all master's degree programs at NDS are approved by ATS.

Each NDS degree program must complete annual Institutional Effectiveness Plans which show how the student learning outcomes are being met using both direct and indirect data. This annual review of data allows the faculty to examine the effectiveness of the individual programs and develop program improvements based on the data. To document the institution's success with respect to student achievement, the NDS mission and the specific goals of each program must be taken into consideration.

Master of Divinity Degree

As the primary mission of Notre Dame Seminary is the preparation of men for ministerial priesthood in the Roman Catholic Church, the seminary offers those preparing for the priesthood the Master of Divinity degree program of study. The four measures used to document the program's success with respect to student achievement are: graduation rates (6 years); enrollment numbers (\geq the average of peer seminaries); percent of graduates who are recommended for ordination; and, grades on theological reflection papers.

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Master of Arts (Philosophy for Theological Studies)

The Master of Arts (Philosophy for Theological Studies) program is offered to give more academically oriented seminarians in the Pre-theology program a deeper exposure to philosophy in preparation for graduate theology studies. Three criteria are used to measure the success of this two-year program are: graduation rates (2 years); retention rates; and, the percent of graduates that are retained for further study at NDS.

Bachelor of Philosophy (Philosophy for Theological Studies)

The Bachelor of Philosophy (Philosophy for Theological Studies) program is offered to college graduates who need to transition into seminary life and complete the undergraduate academic courses in philosophy, theology, and Latin required by the USCCB's Program for Priestly Formation. This program, therefore, aims to prepare men to study theology at the graduate level in preparation for ordination. Three measures for assessing student success for this program are: graduation rates (2 years); retention rate; and, the percentage of men who continue priestly formation at NDS.

Master of Arts (Theological Studies)

The Master of Arts (Theological Studies) degree is offered to seminarians choosing to receive an academic degree and to non-seminarian applicants seeking to deepen his or her understanding of Catholic theology and/or preparing for leadership and catechetical roles in the Church. Three measures used to measure the student achievement in this program are: graduation rates (6 years); percentage of students who gain employment in fields related to the degree; and, grades on the comps or thesis.

Master of Arts in Pastoral Leadership

The Master of Arts in Pastoral Leadership degree program is composed of students who have completed the Institute for Lay Ecclesial Ministry (ILEM) Commissioning program and wish to take additional theology courses to earn a master’s degree. ILEM is committed to educating and forming men and women in the human, spiritual, intellectual and pastoral dimensions of lay ecclesial ministry. Candidates who successfully complete the ILEM program are commissioned by their bishop as lay ecclesial ministers. The MAPL degree program is available to those

participants, who by taking on additional courses and assignments, wish to receive such a degree. This degree would then serve to provide additional graduate-level competence for future lay ecclesial ministers. Although approved to begin accepting students in the Fall 2014 semester, the program did not actually begin to accept students until the Fall 2015 semester. Three criteria used to measure student achievement in this program are: graduation rates (6 years); percentage of students who gain or maintain employment in fields related to the degree; and, grades on the Capstone Project.
